New secretary takes helm

ongtime Tobacco Valley resident Pam Rackley took over the position of Lincoln County Fair Secretary and Manager in November of 2021.

Rackley started out as an assistant to Svea Jorgensen, the previous fair secretary and 4-H manager. As the workload of both positions increased and became untenable, Jorgensen moved to focus on 4-H and Rackley stepped up to to head the fair.

Rackley is originally from Portland, Oregon, and has lived in the Tobacco Valley area for 26 years. Over the years, her entire family fell in love with the area and both her mom and her husband's parents now live nearby. Rackley is also an artist and creates rock paintings that she sells at the farmers market and other events throughout the year.

Rackley is passionate about her job. She was in 4-H when she was a child, but she said it wasn't nearly as developed as it is in the Tobacco Valley. "I love the fair. And it's great. When people come together and volunteer to help out, and they want to be part of something like that. - I love that part of it," she said.

This year's fair will include some new vendors and see the return of Kidsville. At the popular attraction, kids and their parents can bounce in inflatable toys, play

old-fashioned booth games, and enjoy face-painting and balloon animals.

Rackley said that the Covid pandemic had a big effect on the fair the last couple of years. In 2020 safety restrictions reduced the size of the event, turning it into just a 4-H fair and eliminating many of the other events and attractions. For 2021, The Bull Thing, open display classes, and other attractions returned, but Kidsville remained on hiatus.

Rackley thinks this will be the year where the fair is back in full force and ready to show its best side to the community and outside visitors.

4-H hog program especially popular for this season

he numbers of pigs entered at Lincoln County Fair this year has eclipsed previous years and necessitated an expansion in the program.

Extension agent Svea Jorgsensen said that there will be 61 hogs at this year's fair, 20 more than in 2021. She attributed the increase to a growing number of children in the in the community that are eight

years or older and meet the 4-H age requirement to raise and sell a pig - and those children learning how lucrative pigs can be.

With that growth, the 4-H program has improved the fairgrounds infrastructure to handle the extra animals. With the help of volunteers and sponsors, the arena was enlarged, the announcer's booth moved to the center of the arena, and two new wash racks were added. Lambs were moved to a different barn to free up more stalls for the pigs, all of which will provide more room to prepare and exercise all of the animals.

Keenan Flanagan, 10, is preparing his pigs to compete at the 2022 Lincoln County Fair.

Flanagan has been raising pigs for three years. He is raising three pigs this year and his two main ones are Porky and Jasmine. The Flanagan family will keep one of the pigs for their own use, one will go to the fair, and the third pig will be raffled off.

Flanagan says the 4-H program has

taught him how to raise, discipline and take care of his animals. He said to raise a pig you have to build a pen, provide straw for bedding and for the pigs to root through in order to satisfy their need for stimuli and to explore their surroundings, a heat lamp to keep the pigs warm when it's cold. He offers three different stages of feed: starter, grower and finisher. Flanagan said the pigs will go through about three bags of food a week, or about 150 pounds.

Flanagan predicts Jasmine will grow to about 270 pounds. Porky was a more expensive piglet, and Flanagan thinks he'll top out between 280 and 300 pounds. Flanagan said that a grown pig can be sold for around \$3,000. Porky and Jasmine will be the largest pigs he has raised so far.

Flanagan said he's going to keep on raising pigs for the next couple of years before he switches to raising cattle. He said he enjoys raising and working with the animals. "I like bonding with the animals," Flanagan said.

Trainer steps up to judge

Trainer Christine Gevas is looking forward to her first year judging the dog division at the Lincoln County Fair.

Gevas is the owner of Chaos K-9, a business located in Rexford and specializing in obedience training. It's named for her Belgian Malinois, Chaos. She has always loved and owned dogs, but only got seriously into training them in the last few years.

Three years ago, Eureka dog trainer Kenyon Evers was offering a free Saturday dog training class at the fairgrounds, and Gevas started attending with her pitbull

Evers has "so much experience training dogs," Gevas said. "He's been doing it his $whole \, life. "Since \, Evers \, specialized \, in \, breeds$ such as Belgian Malinois and German Shepherds, Gevas was inspired to adopt a Belgian Malinois, and started training it with Kenyon's help.

She now has six dogs of her own, all either rescues or in the case of her pitbull hound, offered for free and therefore at risk of ending up in a fighting ring. She also has a pitbull pointer mix "who has some issues," she said.

Her two Malinois came from a Malinois

rescue, another dog came from a shelter in California, and she adopted a cattle dog because he had the habit of chasing cows and couldn't perform the work his original owners had wanted him to.

Some of her dogs come from tough backgrounds, but Gevas is up to the challenge. What she loves about dogs is "their loyalty, how smart they are, their forgiving nature - like being a beginning handler, they can be real forgiving partners in that," she said. She also loves that they are protective.

In addition to her judge duties, Gevas is renting a building at the fairgrounds and offering her services for free to 4-H students "so that they can have a real trainer that they can go to, to help them if they would like with the dog classes."

The fair also offers other dog classes which are open to the public, Gevas said.

There are various skills highlighted in the dog division. Judge Erin Kelly will join Gevas and will focus on agility and tricks. Kelly is also a trainer, and has won titles with her dogs in various competitions. One event Kelly will judge at the fair even includes costumes.

With her focus on rescue dogs, Gevas is dedicated to foundational skills and obedience. "It'll be a new experience, doing the judging," she said. "I really am looking forward to that."






